




Open Power Chords

Power chords are found extensively in rock, pop, blues and metal.


They are one of the easiest chord types to play on the guitar as you only need to use one finger, as demonstrated in the exercise below.








6th String Power Chords


Now we will begin to explore the guitar neck beyond the first three frets using movable power chords.

Movable Power chords can be found in many classic guitar riffs such as The Kinks' "You Really Got me", Black Sabbath's "Iron Man", Survivor's "Eye of the Tiger" and Nirvana's "Smells like Teen Spirit".



Tip: The white note within the chord is the root note. The root note is what gives the chord its name.







5th String Root Power Chord


Tip: The white note within the chord is the root note. The root note is what gives the chord its name.



Notes Along the A String

The diagram below shows the notes along the length of the A string.

To play a particular chord we need to ensure that the root note is in the correct fret, e.g. for a C5 power chord place the root note at the third fret.













An alternative approach to playing power chords is to use three fingers, giving the chord a fuller sound.
